While it may seem strange to remark on the fast-approaching fall season when it is 35 degrees outside in Essex County, the fact is that our fall season officially starts on August 1. Usually, there is a relaxing lull in the monitoring programs on Pelee Island during July. With the spring banding and census completed and marsh monitoring and Species at Risk monitoring finished, PIBO staff look forward to a three-week break before the busy fall season begins. However, this year was a little different. 2025 is the last year of the Ontario Breeding Bird Atlas 3 project, and birders and those working at bird observatories across Ontario are furiously trying to log as many breeding birds as possible to be included in the data sets. PIBO's field supervisor, Sumiko Onishi, is included among them. Breeding evidence was confirmed for Common Gallinule, Northern Mockingbird, and Yellow-breasted Chat, and we updated the breeding evidence of King Rail as 'probable'.

Construction of the New Bird Centre has finally begun!

After much anticipation and some inevitable delays, the Pelee Island Bird Observatory has officially begun the construction of the new PIBO Bird Centre on Pelee Island. A local contractor broke ground on June 9, and work has been progressing steadily. With the

favourable summer weather, we are anticipating that much of the work will be completed by the time the ferry stops for the winter. Spring and early summer of 2026 will see the completion of the remaining interior work. We can't promise a finish date just yet, but we are excited to throw open the doors to the new bird centre for all our friends and supporters! Stay tuned for further developments.
